

Robert Armstrong: Afterimages

Rudely finished and ostensibly naive, Robert Armstrong's paintings are surprisingly intriguing. They appear to record a series of fantasy landscapes, a world of volcanoes and valleys in which a tribe of tiny people are drawn across a dark plain towards a mammoth boulder. Titles such as Deluge, Ark and The Red Sea reveal a biblical genesis not immediately apparent, however. Armstrong employs a wide variety of sources, sending his viewers in one direction only to pull them back. This is rough-and-ready painting, occasionally mucky, but with moments that reveal unexpected depths, as in the red flames scraped from beneath a layer of thick green in The Burning Bush, and the use of contrasting colour in The Valley of the People Who Don't Know Anything (above). Armstrong imbues these little paintings with something monumental, creating a tension between the intimate and the majestic. It really shouldn't work, but it does.
